# Introduction:

If you are searching for money to attend college, to complete an advanced degree program, to complete technical or professional training or simply to pay for pre-K through high school (in charter or private schools), then you have taken the first step in the right direction. It has been said that a good rule of thumb is that tuition rates will increase at about twice the general rate of inflation. During any 17-year period from 1958 to 2001, the average annual tuition inflation rate was between 6% and 9%, ranging from 1.2 times to 2.1 times general inflation. On average, tuitions tend to increase about 8% per year. An 8% college inflation rate means that the cost of college doubles every nine years. For a baby born today, this means that college costs will be more than three times current rates when the child begins college.

College cost inflation rate projections are based on the Digest of Education Statistics for the years 1958-1970 and the College Board figures for four-year private colleges for the years from 1971 to the present. General inflation figures are based on the annual Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers figures from the Bureau of Labor statistics.

Statistically, there is no historical correlation between college inflation rates and general inflation rates. Increases in college tuition rates represent a very small percentage of the CPI. Even the rule of thumb that college costs increase at twice the inflation rate is not valid. The range of the college cost inflation rate has run from a high of 6.5 times to a low of one half the general inflation rate. The recent average has been about twice the general inflation rate. In recent years the college cost inflation rate has been decreasing to 5% as colleges try to control escalating costs.

However, given the state of our economy, it is anybody's guess if this trend will continue. The likely answer is that it will not.

Considering that nearly half of all U.S. college students receive federal aid to fund their education, the U.S. Congress asked the Government Accounting Office (GAO) to investigate the soaring price of college textbooks. Guess what the GAO found out?

Over the last 20 years, college textbook prices have increased at twice the rate of inflation but have followed close behind tuition increases.

Increasing at an average of 6 percent per year, textbook prices nearly tripled from December 1986 to December 2004, while tuition and fees increased by 240 percent and overall inflation was 72 percent.

With college cost inflation rates on a pace to triple in the next 18 years, the earlier one begins to accumulate money for college the better.

In the pages of this e-book you will find direct links to federal, state and local government agencies, private foundations, nonprofit organizations and educational institutions that are sources of money to pay for the costs associated with completing pre-k through 12<sup>th</sup> grade public, private and charter educational programs, professional and technical training programs, college degree programs and graduate degree, intern, professorial, research and fellowship programs.

Money-For-Education.Com e-Book will not waste your time with details that are unrelated to your search for money needed to attend college or other educational programs. Its only focus is to put you in touch with direct sources of funds that can be used for educational purposes. From these pages you can do a nationwide search or confine it to a specific geographical area. You can submit your application for funding within most of the links.
