



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

MAIN CONDITIONS OF SERVICE: SUMMARY

Notification of Absences: notify your supervisor by 10 a.m. if you are unable to report for duty. Sick Leave: permanent Officers are credited with 2 weeks full pay and 2 weeks half pay Special Leave: up to 3 days a year; for emergency leave e.g. illness of spouse, attend a funeral Bereavement Leave: 3 days a year; for death of close relative

Long Service Leave: 3 months leave after 10 years service plus 3/10ths of a month per year of service thereafter. Study Leave: up to 5 hours per week for approved courses

Maternity Leave: 12 weeks leave on full pay; maximum absence 52 weeks

Leave Bonus: payable on application for at least one week's recreation leave and is calculated in the following manner: (Annual Salary at 1 January x 6, divided by 313) x (no. of weeks accrued) x (17.5 divided by 100)

Outside Employment: Officers wanting to undertake paid employment outside the Public Service must seek permission from the Chief Officer before they commence the employment.

Resignation: An Officer may tender his resignation at any time, but, it is expected that he give at least two weeks notice.

RESPONSIBILITIES IN THE INDUCTION AND PROBATION PERIOD

Your responsibilities as a probationer are:

To learn the basic job skills and perform them at the required standard To behave in the manner expected of Officers in the work area;

To decide whether or not you wish to pursue a career in the Australian Public Service.

OBLIGATIONS OF A PUBLIC SERVANT

As you are employed to administer government policies and programs at public expense, you owe a special duty to the community. Simply stated, this involves an obligation to give value for money, not only in administering public policies and programs, but also in your personal performance and day to day conduct.

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Regulation 7 says that you have a responsibility to "acquaint yourself with the Public Service Act and these regulations".

DUTY AND BEHAVIOUR

During the hours of official business devote yourself exclusively and zealously to your particular job. Behave courteously at all times to the public and give prompt attention to all reasonable requests and requirements.

Obey promptly all instructions given to you by your supervisor.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY (EEO)

Public Service EEO legislation recognises that there are groups of people subject to discrimination in employment matters. The four traditionally-disadvantaged groups are Aboriginals, disabled, migrants from non-English speaking backgrounds, and women.

EEO Programs aim to assist these groups by removing unfair barriers to their employment and advancement, and by improving labour force skills.

The ABS has established EEO co-ordinators in each State Office and in Central Office. More information about ABS EEO programs can be obtained from these Officers.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

This covers a range of unsolicited behaviour which constitutes a deliberate verbal or physical affront of a sexual nature against another person. It extends from unwelcome actions such as leers, gestures or comments of a sexual nature, to physical contact such as petting, pinching or brushing against another person's body, to subtle or explicit demands for sexual activities and actual molestation.

PROVISIONS OF FLEXTIME

Earliest starting time – 8.00 a.m.

Latest Finishing Time – 6.00 p.m.

Settlement Period – Consists of two fortnights. The first reporting fortnight is recorded on a blue card and the second on a pink card.

Lunchbreak – A minimum break of half an hour must be taken between 12.00 noon and 2.00 p.m.

Maximum Hours Worked – 5 hours without break

Flex Credit – Carryover limited to fifteen hours (after 2 x 2 weeks)

Flex Debit - Maximum debt accumulation at any time is ten hours

Core Time Absence - Prior approval required

Abuse of Flextime - Will result in

(i) A direction to preclude you from participation in Flextime.

(ii) Disciplinary action under section 55 of the Public Service Act which could lead to dismissal.

1. HISTORY AND CHRONOLOGY

1.1 The First People in Tasmania

Aboriginal people have been in Australia for at least 50,000 years. They probably came from java and perhaps China...

The Tasmanian Aborigines arrived in Tasmania more than 20,000 years ago...

2. PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT

2.1 Location and Area

The State of Tasmania is a group of islands lying south of the south-east corner of the Australian mainland. Roughly shield-shaped with the greatest breadth in the north, the Tasmanian mainland extends from 40 degrees 38 minutes to 43 degrees 39 minutes south latitude and from 144 degrees 36 minutes to 148 degrees 23 minutes east. The coastline is bounded by the Southern Ocean on the south and west and the Tasman Sea on the east, while the approximately 240 kilometres wide Bass Strait separates the island from the Australian mainland. Macquarie Island, a part of the State, is situated at 54 degrees 38 minutes south latitude, 158 degrees 53 minutes latitude...

The area of the whole State, including the lesser islands, is 68,331 square kilometres or about 0.9 per cent of the total area of Australia; it is ...less than half the size of England and Wales...

Tasmania could legitimately be called the island of mountains, since it has the largest proportion of high country to its total area, compared with the other states...Tasmania is "probably the most thoroughly mountainous island on the globe..."

2.2 Climate

Since Tasmania lies between 40 and 43 $\frac{1}{2}$ degrees south and is an island with no point more than 115 kilometres from the sea, its climate is classified as temperate maritime...

3. GOVERNMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

3.1 Australia's federal system

Since 1 January 1901, Australia has been a federation of six states. In 1911 two territories, the Australian Capital territory and the Northern Territory were transferred to the Commonwealth from New South Wales and South Australia.....
