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
A FUNNY ENGLISH READING TEST

An ace card




ant (ant) - a is the short a sound.

ace $(\bar{a}s) - \bar{a}$ is the <u>long a sound</u>. (See page 9 for <u>Phonics Rule #2</u>.)

acorn $(\bar{a}'-k\bar{o}rn) - \bar{a}$ is the long a sound.

<u>Phonics Rule #1</u>: When you see <u>one vowel</u> in a word, usually use the <u>short vowel sound</u>. This rule works for about 2/3 of English words. (The vowels are **a**, **e**, **i**, **o**, **u** and sometimes **y**.)







bus $(b\bar{u}s) - \bar{u}$ is the short u sound.

cat $(k\breve{a}t) - \mathbf{k}$ is the <u>hard c sound</u>; \breve{a} is the <u>short a sound</u>.

dog $(d\check{o}g) - \check{o}$ is the <u>short o sound</u>.

cellphone (sel'-fon) - s is the <u>soft c sound</u>.

egg $(\check{e}g) - \check{e}$ is the <u>short e sound</u>.

fish $(fi\underline{sh}) - \mathbf{i}$ is the <u>short i sound</u>; <u>**sh**</u> is the <u>sh sound</u>.

eagle $(\bar{e}'-g\bar{u}l) - \bar{e}$ is the <u>long e sound</u>.

<u>Phonics Rule #2</u>: When you see <u>two vowels</u> in a word or a syllable including a word ending in an "e," usually use the <u>long</u> <u>vowel sound of the first vowel</u>, which is the same as the name of the letter. (The second vowel is silent.) This rule works for about 2/3 of English words. (The vowels are **a**, **e**, **i**, **o**, **u** and sometimes **y**.)



jar (jŏr) – the letter **a** sometimes says $\mathbf{\check{o}}$ ($\mathbf{\check{o}}$ = the <u>ah sound</u> = $\mathbf{\ddot{a}}$).


lion $(l\bar{\imath}'-\check{u}n) - \bar{\imath}$ is the <u>long i sound</u>.

mouse (moves) - over and over and over a sound.

nose $(n\bar{o}z) - \bar{o}$ is the <u>long o sound</u>; sometimes the letter **s** makes the <u>z sound</u>.
