Transport officers started delivering inmates from different parts of the jail, locking them in with me—and maybe other volunteers—as they left to go pick up more.

As the inmates arrived, we got the chance to shake the hand of each one. This kind of human contact was forbidden in the modules. It was during these moments before all arrived that I had the chance to chat with those I didn't know. When we got a new face, I tried to establish a relationship that I could continue later in his module.

Men sometimes attended for the wrong reasons. Maybe it was to meet up with a buddy. Maybe the man was just bored.

One inmate came in early, giving me a chance to chat with him. He didn't talk much. He was a man of few words. His outward appearance and demeanor told me he was street-wise, hard, and mean. He crossed his legs and arms, looking around him, casing the place. My chatting with him was of not much effect.

He looked me in the eye, unfolded his tattooed arms, pointed with one finger at his wrist on his other arm where he used to wear a wristwatch, which was now in the property room. "How long this thing gonna take?" he growled, making sure I knew he didn't care to be there after all. His voice was tainted with a bit of disgust and anger.


